Later we will remember that Plato's Demiurge <u>began with a</u> <u>straight line</u> as the timeless beginning. Plato derives the visible perceivable universe <u>by bending</u> the straight line. The curved is the rotating world we perceive. Aristotle will later allude to Plato's theory. Aristotle will move from

## perception to understanding by <u>pulling the curved line out</u> <u>straight again!</u>
